

Building Bridges: How PDL Supports ESL and Indigenous Youth in Our Community



At the Petoskey District Library (PDL), we believe a library is more than just a home for books—it is a vital resource, a safe haven, and a welcoming

gateway for every member of our community. In a recent conversation, **Robin Ingalls** (pictured above), Special Populations Specialist at the Public Schools of Petoskey, shared the profound joys and complex challenges of her dual role coordinating English as a Second Language (ESL) and Indigenous education right here in Petoskey. Her insights shed light on how local collaboration is breaking down barriers and fostering a deep sense of belonging for our area's youth.

Stepping into a position that bridges Title VI (Indigenous Education) and Title III (ESL) responsibilities is no small feat. Ingalls candidly shared that she initially hesitated to take on the role, deeply aware that she herself is neither Indigenous nor bilingual. However, local mentors, including Elder Frank Ettawageshik, offered foundational advice that guided her path forward: *be authentic and focus entirely on supporting the youth.*

By centering her work on the needs of the students, Ingalls has successfully navigated the complex task of joining Indigenous

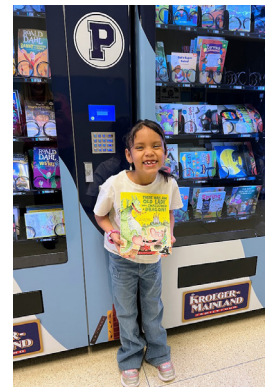
and ESL advocacy. The demographics of local ESL students fluctuate constantly, with families drawn to the Little Traverse Bay area from all corners of the globe, including China, Colombia, Pakistan, and Vietnam. Without dedicated ESL teachers in every classroom, tailoring individualized learning plans becomes an immense hurdle.

Newcomer families often arrive balancing the stress of integration with unfair cultural misconceptions. "Our students show incredible resilience," Ingalls noted, emphasizing the immense cultural and intellectual contributions these families bring to the region. To help these students succeed academically while preserving their native languages and heritage, community-wide support is essential.

This is where the PDL steps in. A public library is uniquely positioned to act as a partner in school-to-community integration. Ingalls highlighted the indispensable assistance of PDL staff members like Nisa, who work tirelessly to source and acquire high-quality, diverse literature in home languages such as Spanish and Vietnamese. These books do not just sit on the shelves; they actively populate local classroom libraries, ensuring

that a student from Pakistan or Colombia can open a book and see their own language and lived experiences reflected back at them. True literacy means honoring a student's native culture while they master a new one.

Ingalls always reminds her students that if their parents are at work and they need assistance, they can always go to the library—a safe, welcoming space where every single staff member is a helper ready to support them. With the strong connection, our newest families gain a place to belong, while our schools become stronger, our classrooms become more connected, and our community becomes better prepared for the future.



As we look toward the future, the goals remain clear: expand language preservation efforts and build a robust network of community advocates. When schools, families, organizations, and neighbors work together, we create a place where every child has the opportunity to learn, grow, and succeed. Together with local educators, PDL is proud to join this story of inclusion, one page and one student at a time.

- **Modernize Finishes:** Update the interior with a timeless, vibrant design that feels authentically "Petoskey."

- **Upgrade Infrastructure:** Thoroughly evaluate and modernize our mechanical, electrical, plumbing, and control systems.
- **Versatile Study & Meeting Areas:** Provide more flexible options for collaboration and quiet study.

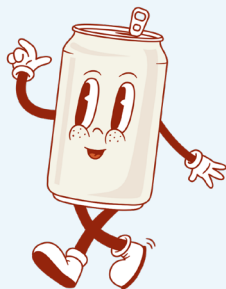

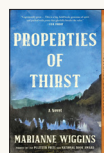
